Located on the traditional lands of the Peramangk people, Mount Barker is a place where a committed, connected community and a combination of culture, geography, environment and infrastructure create unique conditions for people to prosper.

The regional city of Mount Barker is destined to become the second biggest population centre outside of Adelaide, including supporting a regional population of 130,000 and 14 smaller townships within the Mount Barker LGA. Strategic and structure planning, research and local engagement is focussing on ecological sustainability, diverse local employment options, a thriving local economy, quality community infrastructure and events to capitalise on the opportunities that await SA's most vibrant growth region.

The region's advantages include a stunning hills landscape, a variety of rural, industrial and retail precincts, proximity to interstate road and rail infrastructure, ample reclaimed water supply and world-class broadband.

The district's close proximity to Adelaide and the attractive natural environment has contributed to the area's popularity with residents, businesses and visitors alike. Because of this, a key part of Council's growth will centre around Natural Parklands, existing and new places of beauty and biodiversity where people can linger, learn, enjoy and be proud of. From the Chief Executive Officer



Welcome to the NGAA National Congress.

As representatives of outer urban growth area councils and communities, we are at the forefront of creating Suburbia 3.0 - Australia's third generation of urban development. Suburbia 3.0 must be better than what has gone before. Our fast growing communities must be sustainable and resilient under changing climate scenarios.

NGAA events like Congress and our Research Symposia are fantastic opportunities to share insights and lessons from our growth areas experiences. We can learn from this and from previous generations of urban development: the first generation in the inner cities with compactness and dwelling diversity; and the open space and attributes of the second generation middle ring suburbs.

A cross sectoral, tri-level commitment to well planned suburbs is integral to creating Suburbia 3.0. Funding is part of this: growth areas need assurance that Federal infrastructure investment will be allocated on the basis of greatest need and impact.

Leadership and engagement at the Federal level is vital to drive reforms and deliver transformational infrastructure in partnership with states and councils. NGAA members have a shared vision of growing communities that are liveable, and thriving. But we can't do it alone. Our vision is unachievable without national policy leadership to support all who are reimagining the future of outer suburban development.

Our discussions today will inform our position on the National Urban Policy framework, the foundation of the major policy overhaul that growth areas need. I look forward to your insights on this crucial next step for Australia's growth areas.

About the NGAA

We are the peak body for local governments in Australia's outer metropolitan growth areas, funded by our member councils. We advocate at the Federal Government level for a stronger focus on the needs of fast-growing outer suburbs. Our members are united by experiences of rapid population growth and infrastructure deficits. Together, we represent more than 5.3 million people living in the fast-growing suburbs around Australia's capital cities.

Notice something new?

We've refreshed our logo to signify the evolution of Australia's growth areas. The new colour of fuchsia represents Suburbia 3.0 and our call for a fresh new approach to national urban policy. We've added a tree outline to show the importance of environment and sustainability for growth areas.

About Australia's fast growing outer suburbs

- One in every five Australians lives in a growth area 5.3 million people
- Growth area populations are growing more than twice as fast as the national average (2.9% growth compared to 1.2%)
- The population of growth areas increased by 34% in the past decade. The rest of Australia grew by just 14.9%.
- There have been more than a thousand new homes approved in growth areas every week for the past six years, and more than 60,000 every year for the past decade.
